[DBP/USPS-36-37]

[b] If so, please provide the details and procedures for obtaining the refund.

[c] Please explain why a change of address can not be accepted from a P.O. Box.

[d] Please provide a listing of those types of addresses which may not be the origin of a change of address order.

DBP/USPS-37 Assume a mailpiece with the following characteristics: A greeting card with an envelope having a length of 5.75 inches, a height of 4.375 inches, and a total

weight of 0.6 ounces. The envelope and card and paper enclosures have thickness of 0.064 inches. The card has been "wrapped" with a 0.6 inch wide cloth-type ribbon. The ribbon is tied with a small knot and bow and the total thickness of the "bump" in the ribbon and the envelope and enclosures is 0.134 inches. The envelope is basically flat except for the spot where the knot and bow of the ribbon exists,

[a] What is the proper postage for this mailpiece under the current rates?

[b] What would the proper postage for this mailpiece be under the proposed rates?

Please explain and discuss.
