(DFC/USPS-T39-36(B, D))


Presiding Officer's Ruling No. R2000-1/33, issued April 10, 2000, partially granted Douglas Carlson's motion to compel a response to interrogatory DFC/USPS-T39-36. According to Rule 26(e), the Postal Service's response was due 7 days later, on April 17, 2000. However, obtaining responsive information involved contacting 3 facilities, and coordination among several postal employees, some of whom were unavailable during the initial response period. As a result, a response was not completed until today, 10 days late. Mr. Carlson was alerted April 18 that the response would be late, and the Postal Service does not believe that any participant will be prejudiced by the lateness of this response.


