

RESPONSE OF UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE WITNESS O'TORMEY TO INTERROGATORIES OF NEWSPAPER ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA

NAA/USPS-ST42-1 For years the newspaper industry has used machines that employ rubber tipped "grabbers" to pick freshly printed newspapers from printing presses-at throughputs of up to 50,000 per hour--and move them to appropriate places in the newspaper facility, including to mailrooms. This technology is fundamentally different from that of the Postal Service. In particular, it involves "grabbing" a product instead of moving the product with belts.

Has the Postal Service ever investigated the possibility of adopting such a technology to the sortation process? Is so, please describe the conclusions the Postal Service reached. If not, please explain why not.

RESPONSE:

The Postal Service's Engineering, Research, and Development organization evaluates technology from numerous industries throughout the world. I am not aware of any specific testing by the Postal Service to evaluate the type of technology you described for the distribution of flat mail. However, I've been told that due to the wide array of flat mail types, this technology would not be beneficial for flat mail distribution.
