REVISED RESPONSE OF UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE
WITNESS ARNETTA L. COBB TO INTERROGATORY OF
THE OFFICE OF THE CONSUMER ADVOCATE [Errata]
(OCA/USPS-T1-33)
(January 10, 2005)

The United States Postal Service hereby provides the revised response of witness Arnetta L. Cobb to interrogatory OCA/USPS-T1-33, filed by the Office of the Consumer Advocate on December 20, 2004. As indicated in witness Cobb's response to OCA/USPS-T1-32, filed on January 10, 2005, the Postal Service has decided that First-Class Mail parcels would not be reshipped Priority Mail postage due in the unlikely event they do not fit into the PFS shipment. This revision means that the first sentence of the original response to OCA/USPS-T1-33 (filed on January 5, 2005) is incorrect. The revised response corrects that sentence, and adds a second sentence that further clarifies the response.

The interrogatory is stated verbatim and is followed by the response.

WITNESS COBB TO INTERROGATORIES
OF THE OFFICE OF THE CONSUMER ADVOCATE

OCA/USPS-T1-33. Please refer to your testimony at page 2, lines 12–16. Please confirm that a First-Class [Mail] package that (1) does not fit into the PFS Priority Mail reshipment, (2) does not require a scan at delivery, and (3) is not treated as accountable mail, will be forwarded as Priority Mail postage due. If you do not confirm, please explain.

RESPONSE:

Not confirmed; please see my response to OCA/USPS-T1-32. In no instance would a First-Class Mail parcel be reshipped Priority Mail postage due. Since such pieces cannot weigh more than 13 ounces, the likelihood that they would fit in the PFS package would be relatively high.
