**RESPONSE OF THE UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE TO

You state there will be no changes to Express Mail collections and delivery and that an additional fee will apply only to Sundays and Federal holidays. Has the Postal Service decided for certain that it will not extend that fee to Saturday deliveries of Express Mail? If no decision has been made, what factors will be considered in making this determination?

RESPONSE

The Postal Service has no current plans to apply an additional fee to Saturday Express Mail delivery in a five-day street delivery environment. Assuming the Postal Service moves to such an operating environment, it is not presently known whether the Postal Service might ever establish such a Saturday delivery fee or what factors might be considered in determining whether to do so.
