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To the Postal Regulatory Commission,

I, along with many Americans, oppose the current proposal to eliminate the current 6 day USPS delivery service in favor of a five-day schedule. Until 1912, mail was delivered seven days a week. After religious leaders appealed to the government, mail service was eliminated on Sunday. Therefore, for the past two hundred years, mail in the United States has been delivered at least six days a week.

I do not oppose USPS cost cutting measures. However, I believe that cutting six day delivery service would be misguided. In fact, I would much rather see postage prices rise, e.g. to \$0.75 for a 1 ounce first-class letter, than see six day delivery eliminated.

Alternatively, I suggest that six day delivery be retained for residential districts, and perhaps eliminated only for commercial/business districts. While most Americans enjoy Saturday mail delivery, many businesses are closed on weekends and don't necessarily need a six day delivery schedule.

If 6 day delivery will be eliminated altogether, notwithstanding the preferences of most Americans, then Wednesday delivery should be eliminated instead of Saturday, so that at most (except for holidays) there would only be a one day gap in mail delivery.

Once again, I urge the Commission to retain a six-day delivery schedule, at least for residential customers.
