**UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE NOTICE OF ERRATA TO
NOTICE OF MINOR CLASSIFICATION CHANGE**
(May 7, 2013)

The United States Postal Service hereby corrects its Notice of Minor Classification Change (“Notice”), which it filed on April 24, 2013, in connection with the renaming of Express Mail and Express Mail International.¹ Specifically, in the Notice the Postal Service stated that:

“While customers will be encouraged to adopt the new product names and packaging as soon as possible, the Postal Service understands that these mid-year name changes will impact our customers’ mailing systems. Accordingly, the Postal Service will allow mailers to continue using the Express Mail and Express Mail International names (and associated packaging) until January 2014.”²

The Notice is corrected to state that:

“While customers will be encouraged to begin using new product packaging as soon as possible, the Postal Service will allow mailers to continue using Express Mail and Express Mail International packaging until their existing supplies are exhausted.”

A corrected version of page 1 of the Notice is being submitted with this pleading.

**NOTICE OF THE UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE OF
MINOR CLASSIFICATION CHANGE**

(April 24, 2013)

Pursuant to 39 C.F.R. §§ 3020.90 and 3020.91, the United States Postal Service (Postal Service) hereby gives notice of minor changes to the Mail Classification Schedule (MCS). The proposed changes reflect the Postal Service's plan to rename Express Mail® and Express Mail International® as Priority Mail Express™ and Priority Mail Express International™. To effectuate these changes, the Postal Service will be revising its regulations in the Domestic Mail Manual (DMM®), International Mail Manual (IMM®), and other related publications. The proposed name changes will take effect on July 28, 2013.¹

While Express Mail has long served as the Postal Service's fastest mailing/shipping service, revenue and volume figures for this product have stagnated in recent years. In an effort to refresh the public's awareness of Express Mail, the Postal Service decided to change the product's name to Priority Mail Express. The name of Express Mail International is also being changed to Priority Mail Express International to
